Commencement Speaker



Dr. Hortensia Soto

Chadron State College's Winter Commencement Speaker will be Dr. Hortensia Soto. Since 2020, Soto, a CSC Distinguished Young Alumni recipient, has been a professor of mathematics at Colorado State University and Graduate Director in the Department of Mathematics since 2023. The combined ceremony for undergraduates and graduates will be Friday, Dec. 12 at 2 p.m. in the Chicoine Center.

Originally from Morrill, Nebraska, Soto earned a bachelor's degree in mathematics and a master's in mathematics education from CSC. She earned an additional master's degree in mathematics from the University of Arizona, and a doctorate in Educational Mathematics from the University of Northern Colorado.

Soto has promoted mathematics via summer outreach programs and frequently facilitates professional development for K-16 teachers, including in the Nebraska Panhandle.

She is a working member of the Mathematical Association of America (MAA) where she has served as associate treasurer, associate secretary, president, and an editor of the MAA Instructional Practices Guide that provides national guidance for effective, research-informed mathematics teaching.

Soto began her career as an assistant and later associate professor of mathematics at Colorado State University–Pueblo from 1995 to 2005. She also taught 15 years at the University of Northern Colorado, advancing to full professor.

She has been recognized for excellence in teaching, mentorship, and service at the departmental, college, and national levels. Early in her career, she was honored with awards such as the Graduate Deans Citation for Excellence and the Most Supportive Faculty Award at CSU-Pueblo.

Recent highlights include a 2022 nomination for the CSU Alumni Association's Best Teacher Award and the prestigious 2018 MAA Deborah and Franklin Tepper Haimo Award for Distinguished College or University Teaching of Mathematics. Additional honors include multiple outstanding faculty recognitions from student groups, residence life programs, and academic units.

Her contributions extend beyond the classroom into research mentorship and institutional service. She earned the College of Natural and Health Sciences' Excellence in Faculty Research Mentor Award and the Excellence in Service Award at the University of Northern Colorado and the MAA Meritorious Service Award.

Soto also contributes to cross-institutional collaborations that investigate professional development opportunities for collegiate instructors and the role of teachers in supporting students' reasoning.

Her research centers on the teaching and learning of K-16 mathematics and embraces a philosophy that claims learning is body-based. She has used this lens in teaching and researching the learning of applicable mathematical concepts.

She has about 100 publications and delivered about 100 talks about her work nationally and internationally. Her early publications included studies on students' geometric reasoning and expert conceptions of complex-valued functions. She has also published extensively about mathematics teacher education, pre-service teacher learning, technology-enhanced instruction, assessment practices, and initiatives supporting women in mathematics.

Soto's 25 years of research centers on how students learn advanced mathematics through visualization, metaphor, and active learning. Her articles focus on deepening mathematical understanding through innovative modes of learning and improving mathematics education from the secondary level to undergraduate and teacher-preparation settings. Recent articles explore imaginative approaches to abstract algebra, and new frameworks in mathematical thinking.

Her extensive publications include recurring contributions to the MAA, as well as numerous peer-reviewed conference proceedings exploring embodied learning, teacher preparation, undergraduate mathematics education, and student engagement. She highlights collaborative partnerships, inclusive pedagogy, broadening participation in STEM, and innovative approaches to understanding and teaching mathematics.

In her free time, she enjoys hiking, snowshoeing, practicing yoga, meditating, and spending time with her son, Miguel.

Academic Regalia

The history of academic dress goes back to the early days of the oldest universities. In England, in the second half of the 14th Century, statutes of certain colleges prohibited “excess in apparel” and prescribed the wearing of a long gown. Originally gowns may have been worn for warmth in the unheated buildings frequented by medieval scholars.

The gown is usually of black material. Bachelor’s gowns have long pointed sleeves; Master’s gowns have full-length square sleeves, crescent-shaped at the bottom; and the Doctor’s gowns have full, round, open sleeves. The Doctor’s gown is closed and faced with panels of velvet down the front. Three velvet bars decorate each sleeve.

The cap, generally the square mortar-board, but sometimes for Doctor’s, a round, soft, flat velvet hat (a style borrowed from foreign universities), bears a tassel which may be black for all ranks and degrees, or may be of gold thread for Doctor’s and the color of the degree for Bachelor’s and Master’s. Only the Doctor’s cap may be of velvet.

The hood is the principal indicator of the nature and source of the degree. Bachelor’s hoods are three feet long with two-inch wide velvet side-panels; Master’s, three-and-one-half feet with three-inch panels, and Doctor’s, four feet with five-inch panels. The silk lining bears the colors of the institution that conferred the degree and the color of the velvet panels indicates the field of study. Hoods may be worn only after the degree has been granted.

Degrees with Honors

Degrees with honors are conferred in accordance with the following index numbers which represent the scholastic ratio for all Chadron State College course work (based on a 4.0 scale). Graduation with academic honors requires the completion of at least 45 hours from Chadron State College by the end of the first 8-week session of the spring 2024 semester. Graduate students and students receiving a second Bachelor’s degree are not eligible for honors.

Chadron State College's Ceremonial Mace

The Chadron State College Ceremonial Mace celebrates the institution's authority to confer degrees and symbolizes its academic independence. The Ceremonial Mace also represents the status of the college's president; as such, it is only present at commencements and other events organized and attended by the President.

The design of the Chadron State College Ceremonial Mace blends Eurasian and Native American traditions. The mace head and three-foot shaft are an ornamental version of an ancient Eurasian weapon. In a practice that dates back at least to the Copper Age, the mace bearer holds a position of influence and respect. Use of maces in academic proceedings in Europe began in the 15th century, and many American institutions have adopted the tradition to acknowledge the continuity of educational structures. These enduring values are represented by two Chadron State College official seals on the mace head.

As we stand today on Lakota, Cheyenne, and Arapaho homelands, the Chadron State College Ceremonial Mace also honors their traditions. The engraved feathers on the mace handle pay homage to the ceremonial Eagle Staff. Also a revered symbol of authority, the Eagle Staff represents strength, honor, unity, and heritage. The Medicine Wheel medallions on the mace head are part of a 5,000-year-old tradition shared by many Indigenous nations. In the modern academy, the Medicine Wheel encourages teaching about biological and human interconnections. The engraved words on the rand beneath the mace head read, "We are all related" in English and "Mitákuye Oyás'ij" in Lakota — they remind us to attend to these values.

The Eagle on top of the mace is an important symbol in many cultures. Everyone involved with Chadron State College thinks of themselves as an Eagle. The Eagle is the college's mascot and we collectively admire the bird's noble spirit. Similarly, in Native American culture, the Eagle represents strength and bravery; its feathers are a sign of sacredness.



Chadron State College's Presidential Medallion

A presidential medallion is an ancient symbol of authority; the chain of office is worn by the head of the college which signifies the institution's charter to confer degrees and honors.

Chadron State College commissioned the creation of a presidential medallion in 2023 as a symbol of the President's Office. The medallion itself bears the seal of the institution, and the links adjoining the chain are engraved individually with the names of the 12 presidents of Chadron State College, dating back to the institution's founding in 1911. The presidential medallion is worn on academic and ceremonial occasions by those who serve Chadron State College as president and will be passed on to each new president to symbolize the transfer of office.

To date, Chadron State College has been served by 13 presidents. Their names and terms of office are listed below.

Joseph Sparks, 1911-1916
